What have Reception been learning this week?

This week in Reception we have been very enthusiastic about our Christmas performance and are very proud of our achievements this term. We have been preparing for Christmas by making decorations and decorating trees in our classrooms. We have been practicing writing our names so please remember to do the same over the holidays. We had our Christmas dinner this week and most of us enjoyed it. We loved wearing our Christmas jumpers and then designing our own!

Next week, Reception will be assessing and consolidating the phonic sounds we have learnt this term. We will also be playing lots of number games to consolidate counting and subitising to 6.

What have Year 1 been learning this week?

Excitement has continued to mount in Year 1 as the final week of term approaches. Rehearsals have been going from strength to strength and the children have been singing and narrating brilliantly. They have also had a busy week of learning. In Science they continued their work on the senses by conducting experiments using their sense of taste and sense of smell. In English everyone has been writing their own version of the Dear Santa story, whilst Maths lessons have involved describing the properties of 3D shapes. The new sound in Phonics this week was 'ew' as in 'screw'. Well done Year 1!

Ask me to tell you about what I tasted in my Science lesson. Ask me to tell you which was my favourite smell in the Science lesson. Ask me to write the words 'drew' and 'chew' using this week's new sound.

Ask me to tell you my version of the Dear Santa story.

What have Year 2 been learning this week?

Year 2 have been enjoying learning about statistics in maths. They have answered questions using the data provided and they also enjoyed creating graphs, tables and tally charts.

In English, they let their creative ideas flow and wrote their own warning story following the structure of a familiar story.

As scientists, they explored a range of materials including glass, plastic and metals. They thought about the materials properties and why they are suitable for certain objects. They used the words transparent, translucent and opaque to describe different plastics.

Ask me to draw tally marks to represent the following numbers -8, 16, 21, 34 Ask me why tallying is a good way to record a large number

Ask me to describe the appearance of my bad character using a simile Ask me to retell my story using story language

Ask me to tell you what transparent and opaque mean Ask me to tell you why plastic is a suitable material for the following-Water bottle Carrier bag Children's building blocks

Penalty Notice Changes

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Attendance, Punctuality and Penalty Notices on 19th August 2024 there are significant changes in the way that Penalty Notices are to be issued and an increase in the charges associated with them. These are nationwide changes implemented for consistency across all Local

Authorities. Term Time Leave is only allowed in exceptional circumstances communicated in advance with evidence provided as soon as possible to the Head of School or Headteacher.

First Offence

For the first time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance the amount will be;

- £160 per parent per child paid within 28 days.
- Reduced to £80 per parent if paid within 21 days.



Please ensure you communicate all absences for your child to school.

Second Offence

Within 3 years of the first offence. The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance the amount will be;

- £160 per parent per child paid within 28 days.
- No reduction for early payment.

Third Offence Onwards - Within 3 years of the first offence

The third time an offence is committed for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued and the case will be presented straight to the magistrate's court. Fines can be around £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found to be guilty in the magistrate's court can show as a criminal record.

Notices to Improve

A Notice to Improve is a final opportunity for a parent to engage in support and improve before a penalty notice is issued. If the national threshold has been met and support is appropriate but offers of support have not been engaged with by the parent or guardian or have not worked, a Notice to Improve should usually be sent to give parents or guardians a final chance to engage in support. A Notice to Improve does not need to be issued in cases where support is not appropriate and an authorised officer can choose not to issue one in any case, including cases where support is appropriate but they do not expect a Notice to Improve would have any behavioural impact (because the parent has already received one for a similar offence).

If sufficient improvement is not made following the service of a Notice to Improve, a penalty notice may be issued either during or at the end of the designated time period.

Don't forget.

Penalty Notices are issues Per Parent, Per Child. For example, 3 siblings absent would result in each parent receiving 3 fines. This could amount to £960

Did you know it's illegal to ride a privately owned electric scooter (e-scooter) in public?



That's because e-scooters are classed as motor vehicles in law. So, in theory, this means that you need an MOT, road tax and insurance to use one, however it isn't currently possible to register e-scooters in this way.

Privately owned e-scooters can only be used on private land, with the permission of the landowner.

You cannot use a privately owned e-scooter on the road, pavement or in a public space. If you do then you risk receiving a large fine, points on your driving licence and your e-scooter could be seized.

Some parts of the UK are running government trials of rental e-scooters. If you're over 16 and have a full or provisional driving licence, then you can use these on public roads and cycle paths.

Just check that your driving licence covers categories AM, A or B,



Did you know you can only ride an e-bike if it meets certain requirements and you are 14 years or over?

Electric bikes are also known as 'electronically assisted pedal cycles (EAPC)' or e-bikes. E-bikes must have pedals that can be used to propel it, and it must show either the power output, or manufacturer of the motor **and** either the batteries voltage, or maximum speed of the bike.

The electric motor must have a maximum power output of 250W, and should not be able to propel the bike when it is travelling more than 15.5mph.

If an e-bike does not meet these requirements then it is classed as a motorcycle or moped, and needs to be registered, taxed and insured, you also need a driving licence and to wear a helmet.

If you are riding an e-bike which does not meet these requirements and it is not registered, taxed or insured, your e-bike could be seized.
