#### **Staffing**

#### School Attendance and Punctuality Phone Calls

We monitor school attendance very closely in line with local and government rules.

If your child's attendance is below 90%, we will contact you over the next few weeks to discuss the reasons and see if we can offer any support or guidance. We accept that illnesses cannot be helped and if your child is not well enough for school then the call will just clarify illness so please do not worry if you receive a phone call as it is part of our usual school procedure.

#### Is my child well enough for school?

The increase in colds and illnesses may cause you to feel less confident with knowing if your child is well enough for school. It is fine to send your child to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This would include general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above. We would encourage you to visit the NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' for further information.

School lunches for infant age children are fully funded so parents do not pay for them. They are yummy!


School Applications for Year 3 or Reception in September 2025 must be completed and submitted by Wednesday 15th January.

For every day your child is absent from school, over 6 hours of instructional time is lost.

# **Penalty Notice Changes**

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Attendance, Punctuality and Penalty Notices on 19<sup>th</sup> August 2024 there are significant changes in the way that Penalty Notices are to be issued and an increase in the charges associated with them. These are nationwide changes implemented for consistency across all Local Authorities. Term Time Leave is only allowed in exceptional circumstances communicated in advance with evidence provided as soon as possible to the Head of School or Headteacher.

#### First Offence

For the first time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance the amount will be:

- £160 per parent per child paid within 28 days.
- Reduced to £80 per parent if paid within 21 days.



Please ensure you communicate all absences for your child to school.

#### Second Offence

Within 3 years of the first offence. The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance the amount will be;

- £160 per parent per child paid within 28 days.
- No reduction for early payment.

#### Third Offence Onwards – Within 3 years of the first offence

The third time an offence is committed for unauthorised term time leave or irregular attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued and the case will be presented straight to the magistrate's court. Fines can be around £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found to be guilty in the magistrate's court can show as a criminal record.

#### Notices to Improve

A Notice to Improve is a final opportunity for a parent to engage in support and improve before a penalty notice is issued. If the national threshold has been met and support is appropriate but offers of support have not been engaged with by the parent or guardian or have not worked, a Notice to Improve should usually be sent to give parents or guardians a final chance to engage in support. A Notice to Improve does not need to be issued in cases where support is not appropriate and an authorised officer can choose not to issue one in any case, including cases where support is appropriate but they do not expect a Notice to Improve would have any behavioural impact (because the parent has already received one for a similar offence).

If sufficient improvement is not made following the service of a Notice to Improve, a penalty notice may be issued either during or at the end of the designated time period.

#### Don't forget.

Penalty Notices are issues Per Parent, Per Child. For example, 3 siblings absent would result in each parent receiving 3 fines. This could amount to £960

#### 10 sessions in 10 weeks

Penalty Notices will be considered for any 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in 10 weeks. 5 Consecutive days of term time leave can trigger a Penalty Notice

#### What have Reception been learning this week?

This week in Reception we have started our topic of Wonderful Winter. We were lucky to get a bit of snow and ice which helped to kick off our learning about Winter. Next week Reception will learn the phonic sounds w and x. In Maths we will be focusing on counting, ordinality and cardinality to 5. We have also got Music Week so will be listening to and making lots of music.

#### What have Year 1 been learning this week?

It has been lovely to welcome back the Year 1 children in 2025! We enjoyed looking at snow that fell on the first day back and what we did in our holidays. We are very excited to start a new year of fun topics. This week we began our Science unit on animals and discussed mammals and birds. We also learnt to retell the story 'Lost and Found' and we worked with numbers up to 20 in maths. Remember to look out for the maths homework sent home on Friday.

Ask me what to name a mammal that we can keep as a pet.

Ask me to name a mammal that is a wild animal.

Ask me to name some of the features of a bird.

Ask me to explain number thirteen.

Ask me to complete the stem sentence: 19 is made of \_\_\_\_ ten and \_\_\_\_.

Ask me to tell you what Oliver (in Lost and Found) was looking for.

Guest speaker <u>Tanya Goodin</u> is a digital detox expert and will provide advice and information on achieving a Smartphone Free Childhood.


The event will take place in Courthouse School Hall and tickets are free so book a place here.
